Around 30 historians and historians from abroad will attend the symposium. At a time of EU enlargement, special attention will be paid to research in Eastern European countries (Croatia, Hungary, Slovenia, Slovakia and the Czech Republic), which has hitherto been largely overlooked.

Accelerated historical intellectual changes whipsawed the reign of Sigismond of Luxembourg, King of Hungary (1387), and King (1410/11) and Emperor (1433) of the Holy Roman Empire. Sigismond's defeat at the Battle of Nicopolis in 1396 marked the climax of the hostilities between the West and the Ottoman Empire. The emergence of the Hussites in Bohemia sparked endless conflicts. The Councils of Constance (1414-18) and Basle (1431) led Sigismond into the international diplomatic arena.
